### PRIME CATTLE (RED)

### **170 PRIME CATTLE**

A very good number forward with more heavier commercial cattle penned this morning. Trade held its own when compared with last week; it would not be advisable to deadweight cattle on Tuesday' prices! The overall market average was 194p/kg.

More steers today (48) with the best in spec bullocks selling to 224p/kg or £1400 in the lump. There was some belly and Holstein influence here.

A firm trade on best heifers from start to finish, selling to a top of 245p/kg with several others above 240p/kg. Less shapely females sold well above deadweight prices generally, again with a bit of belly and fat in evidence.

Bull numbers were improved and this helped fulfil regular orders. Sucklers sold to 225p/kg with heavy sucklers to £1523. Holstein bulls sold well if meated to a high of 186p/kg.

### **ONLY 9 COWS & 1 STOCK BULL**

More cows were needed on this trade with good Blonde cows selling to 182p/kg for 734kg (£1335) from LH Wardle. There were no good Friesian/Holsteins forward with the best available to 122p/kg for Henry Yates and Bill Rodenhurst. 1072kg Limousin stock bulls added up to £1436.48

### **130 CLEAN CATTLE**

**48 steers sold to av. 186p/kg** – A super run from Alastair Beedles this section with two Limousin steers selling to 224p/kg. Blondes sold to 216p/kg from Martin Osborne, with shapey British Blues to 216p/kg from LH Wardle. 646kg Blues sold to 211p/kg from Peter Raybould. Gerald Kincaid's heaviest sold to £1399.32 for 676kg Limousins. Herefords sold to 182p/kg from Sam Jordin, with Holsteins to 175p/kg from Rob Charles.

**82** Heifers sold to average 200p/kg — Best butchers sorts were thinner on the ground today with Steve Howells travelling from Wales and achieving 245p/kg. Richard Parkes sold his normal quality to 243p/kg and 240p/kg, with Matt Bower also selling to 243p/kg. British Blues at 602kg sold to £1384.60 from John Cantrill.

These clean averages include cattle over 48 months and both Farm Assured and non-assured cattle.

### 40 BULLS SOLD TO OV. AV. 185P/KG

Trade was very good and more bulls were required with regular lorries waiting. Ian Morris returned to top the section at 225p/kg for 552kg Limousin. 592kg and 660kg Limousins from Steve Perkins sold to 217p/kg and 213p/kg, with 636kg Lims to 216p/kg from Todd Harris. 566kg Blondes sold to

211p/kg from Brian Watkins, with Matt Bower's 722kg model adding up to £1523.42.

Mark Beaumont topped the black and white department at 186p/kg with Henry Yates selling to 183p/kg. Well-finished Holsteins were probably the pick of the trade.

The overall average up on last week with a very mixed entry, with a weight range of 22.5kg to 57kg. Heavy hoggs hard work averaging £89.70 per head to £98.10 for 54.5kg at 180p/kg from Henry Yates.

Handier weight hoggs a very brisk trade to 221p/kg for 44kg Texels from GR Woolley. With 44kg the cut off point for export trade, throughout the sale 36kg to 44kg sold to over £2/kg, with the trade seeking even pens of lean, finished lambs.

Almost 250 hoggs under 33kg selling to 214p/kg for Beltex from lan Morris although generally Continental cross around 180p/kg and Welsh tups at 170p/kg plus.

### **RED TRACTOR TEAM CONSULTATION MEETING**

### HELD AT STONELEIGH ON THURSDAY 12TH FEBRUARY

Subject discussed: Delivering Lifetime Assured Beef

As you may be aware, Nock Deighton Agricultural LLP organised a coach to travel to the above event. As members of the Livestock Auctioneers Association, we feel that this is an issue which many cattle farmers are unaware of and do not fully grasp the implications to them. This meeting was the last of three held by the RTT nationally to gauge industry opinion. 35 farmers and auctioneers attended from the Bridgnorth and Shrewsbury area.

It appeared that the only hard evidence for whole life assurance to be of benefit to the industry was two national surveys carried out by an independent group where only 2,000 people were asked various questions. Although the surveys leant towards the housewife believing the Red Tractor logo to mean "for all of the animal's life", it must be noted that 64% of people did not know what Red Tractor was!

Whilst we may or may not all agree with the philosophy of whole life assurance, it falls down dramatically as not everyone who uses the label has to buy into the scheme. Farmers, auctioneers, hauliers, abattoirs and packers all pay their licence fee and are subject to inspection to meet the ever changing standards to be able to use the Red Tractor logo. However, the large supermarkets, where the surveys were carried out, have no obligation to use the logo and pay no contribution to the Red Tractor board. Sainsburys do not use the logo on their meat displays and Marks and Spencer have never used Red Tractor.

Should lifetime assurance be implemented (and this is a strong possibility), farmers who sell store cattle who are not currently assured will be at a disadvantage. Farm Assured feeders will not be allowed to purchase non-assured cattle as they do at present. Many smaller store cattle vendors will be forced out of business — this cannot be right and will not help rural communities on the marginal areas where many of these affected producers farm. Of course as things stand, every farmer has the choice to buy into the Red Tractor. We believe this should remain the business decision of individual farmers.

Needless to say, of the 150-200 people attending this consultation, the largest majority were against this proposal.

We advise every producer to fill in the Consultation Questionnaire having read the consultation document, all of which are available from the market office or online from the Red Tractor or Nock Deighton websites. If you do not agree with whole life assurance, just answer NO whilst you can still do something about it.
